On behalf of the School Facilities Board, I am pleased to transmit to you the School Facilities Board Annual Report for fiscal year 2010.

The report details the Board's actions during the course of this year. In FY 2010, with the help of the Board, school districts opened six SFB funded new schools. The Board distributed \$4.8 million in Building Renewal Grant funding and \$1.6 million in Emergency Deficiencies Corrections funding. The Board was also awarded \$20 million in American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant funds to supplement district funds for energy efficiency projects, as well as funding solar energy systems in our smallest school districts. The Overview section of this report presents these and other FY 2010 achievements.

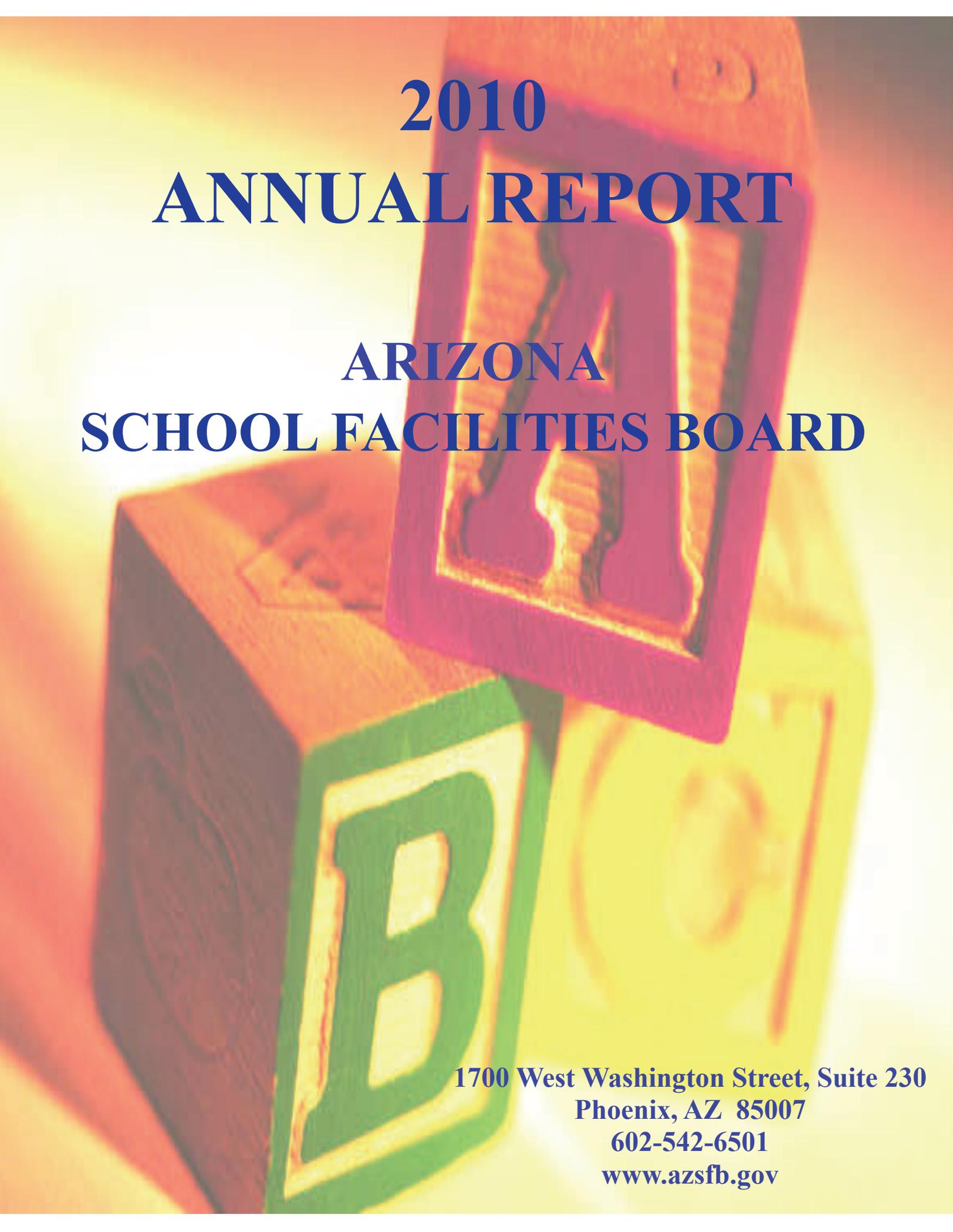
During the upcoming year, the School Facilities Board looks forward to continuing to improve school facilities. Despite the State's fiscal challenges, there are several steps we can take. Preventative maintenance, creative school design, staff training, and tight controls on electrical and gas consumption need to be addressed in these times of budget restrictions. The School Facilities Board can play a larger role in training school personnel and communicating with local school district leadership to ensure that every capital dollar is used appropriately. 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Students FIRST Summary

Students FIRST - In 1994, Arizona's system of school capital finance was declared unconstitutional because it failed to conform to the State constitution's "general and uniform" clause. That system relied on the secondary property tax, driven by the property wealth of a school district, and general obligation bonding. In 1996, the Arizona Superior Court imposed on the State a deadline to develop a constitutional system of school capital finance or risk closure of K-12 public schools. As a result, Governor Jane Dee Hull signed legislation that dramatically reformed the way K-12 schools are constructed in Arizona. This ended the four-year legal and legislative battle and established Arizona as the nation's school finance reform leader. This legislation/law is known as Students FIRST (Fair and Immediate Resources for Students Today).

School Facilities Board - Students FIRST is a capital finance program funded by appropriations from the State General Fund. The program is administered by the School Facilities Board (SFB), which consists of nine voting members appointed by the Governor; in addition, the Superintendent of Public Instruction serves as a non-voting member. The Board is charged with the administration of three capital funds: 1) New School Facilities, 2) Building Renewal, and 3) Emergency Deficiencies Corrections.

New School Facilities - Students FIRST established a new school facilities fund for the purpose of constructing new schools to meet the minimum adequacy guidelines. The criteria to determine district eligibility for new school facilities funding are based on an annual evaluation and approval of district enrollment projections and the additional square footage that will be needed to maintain adequacy standards in a district.

Building Renewal - Students FIRST established a building renewal fund for the purpose of maintaining the adequacy of existing school facilities. These monies can be used for major renovations and repairs of a building, for upgrades to building systems that will maintain or extend the useful life of a building, and for infrastructure costs. A building's square footage, age, and the student capacity are used in the building renewal calculation.

Emergency Deficiencies Corrections - The Emergency Deficiencies Corrections Program is an application-based funding program wherein school districts may apply to the SFB for funds to correct facility deficiencies that threaten the functioning of the school district, the preservation or protection of property or public health, welfare or safety. The cost of the correction must also exceed the current year budget.

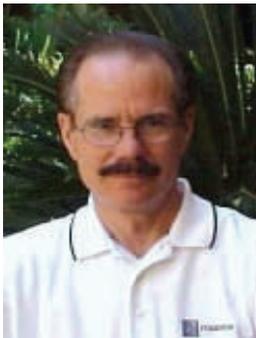
Dr. Bill Johnson

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Introduction

Arizona School Facilities Board Annual Report Requirements

The Annual Report requirements are prescribed in A.R.S. §15-2002.

A.R.S. §15-2002

The school facilities board shall:

...

9. Submit an annual report by December 15 to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the superintendent of public instruction, the director of the Arizona state library, archives and public records and the governor that includes the following information:

(a) A detailed description of the amount of monies distributed by the school facilities board in the previous fiscal year.

(b) A list of each capital project that received monies from the school facilities board during the previous fiscal year, a brief description of each project that was funded and a summary of the board's reasons for the distribution of monies for the project.

(c) A summary of the findings and conclusions of the building maintenance inspections conducted pursuant to this article during the previous fiscal year.

(d) A summary of the findings of common design elements and characteristics of the highest performing schools and the lowest performing schools based on academic productivity** including the results of the parent quality rating survey.

** For the purposes of this paragraph, "academic productivity" means academic year advancement per calendar year as measured with student-level data using the statewide nationally standardized norm-referenced achievement test.

Arizona School Facilities Board

This report details the School Facilities Board's efforts in its legislatively assigned duties.

In addition, in FY 2010 the School Facilities Board reviewed and updated the SFB Capital Plan policy to accommodate legislative changes and statutory requirements.

New School Facilities

The School Facilities Board awards new school facilities funding to school districts that do not have sufficient academic space to house their students. Sufficient space is determined by comparing district capacity to ADM projections.

ADM change is a function of a large number of factors. In order to make the most accurate projections, the SFB staff collects data from a wide variety of sources including:

- Historical ADM data for each district;
- Census of population and housing as tabulated by the National Center for Education Statistics at the school district level;
- Residential housing completion data from Maricopa and Pinal Counties;
- Permitting data from other counties;
- Birth data for all of Arizona;
- Aerial maps and housing development data for the Phoenix metro area;
- Projections of population, housing, and employment for Maricopa County

In most cases, since these data are not provided at the district level, the SFB uses GIS software to analyze the data on a school district level.

In addition, the SFB staff has calculated and published ADM yield factors (ADM per residential housing unit) for every school district in Arizona based on the 2000 census. Included is a time series of ADM yield factors for each school district in Maricopa County that shows how the yield factors change over time. Staff plans to update this information based on results of the 2010 census when they become available.

Also, available on the SFB website (www.azsfb.gov) are birth data for each district between 2001 and 2009. The SFB staff has built projection models that take advantage of available data and accommodate school districts at different stages of development.

The SFB did not authorize any new school projects to start construction in FY 2010 due to the new construction moratorium, and projects that were already under construction last year were completed in FY 2010. Those projects are listed in Table 1 and shown on pages 16 and 17 of this report.

In FY 2010, the SFB disbursed approximately \$10 million to school districts for new construction and land costs. See Exhibit I on page 33 for a complete distribution list.

These expenditures include design, furniture, fixtures, equipment and all construction costs. By adding square footage and other enhancements, school districts added approximately 45 percent to the cost of projects completed in FY 2010. Districts added a total of 95,713 square feet to SFB funded schools in FY 2010.

In the FY 2010 Capital Plan cycle, the SFB awarded three new construction projects with a total budget of \$23.4 million. Several previously approved projects were cancelled or downsized, resulting in a net reduction of \$282 million for FY 2010. Reductions were necessary due to updated ADM projections based on changing demo-

graphics, changes in the housing market within a district, and changes made by the Legislature regarding the weight of a kindergartner in student count (see more information on this in the New School Facilities Changes section below).

Approved projects and their current status are listed in Table 2.

New School Facilities Changes

In the 2010 legislative session, the Legislature passed major changes to the New School Facilities Program.

First, the Legislature extended the moratorium that was implemented in FY 2009 on all new school construction activity. Similar to FY 2009, the FY 2010 law authorized the SFB to approve new construction projects, subject to legislative appropriation.

Second, the legislature reversed the FY 2009 statute change which recognized kindergarten students as full

students. For FY 2010, the Legislature changed this back to 1/2 ADM. While the majority of Arizona kindergarten students attend full-day programs, the new school construction formula requires the SFB to consider them as half-students. School districts that received New Construction awards in FY 2009 based on full-day kindergarten were re-evaluated in FY 2010 based on the reversion of the law and many of the projects were cancelled as a result of the reduction from 1 to 0.5 in student count.

Third, 2010 Ariz. Sess. Laws., 2nd Reg. Sess., Ch. 332, § 35 authorized an adjustment to the formula funding for new school facilities projects that were approved by the SFB between January 1, 2005 and November 4, 2009 and continue to qualify in FY 2011, but have been delayed by the moratorium. The cost per square foot shall be updated to the approved formula amount at the time the project is issued for bid.

Finally, the Legislature provided \$100 million in lease-to-own authority for the construction of new schools. Land acquisition and new

construction funded from this authority are exempt from the moratorium. Priority for use of these funds will be given to districts with ADM that currently exceeds district capacity. The bonds will be issued through a federal bonding program called Qualified School Construction Bonds. Under this program, the bond holder receives federal tax credits in lieu of interest.

ARRA Energy Grant Program

The Governor's Office through the Department of Commerce Energy Office directed approximately \$20 million of the State Energy Block Grant awarded as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) funding for solar and energy efficiency projects for schools. The School Facilities Board has allocated approximately 30% of these funds for solar projects and 70% for energy efficiency projects.

The allocated funding for solar projects equates to approximately \$5 million. The solar energy grants will be awarded to districts based on square footage, with priority given to the smallest school districts. The award includes solar water heating or a solar photovoltaic system from 4 KWdc to 30 KWdc. In FY 2010, the SFB awarded solar projects to 30 districts and is planning to award more in FY 2011. See Table 3 for a list of districts awarded solar projects.

The remaining 70% of the grant

funding has been allocated for energy efficiency projects. These funds will mainly be used to replace and upgrade lighting, lighting controls, HVAC, and HVAC controls. The energy efficiency grants will be awarded through a competitive application process and will cover 30% of the total project cost, up to \$1 million per district. The school district will be responsible for funding the balance of the project cost and may use performance contracting or any available local funds. The criteria for project selection are life-cycle payback, energy savings measured by unit reductions, energy savings measured by dollar reductions, and impact on the school utility budget. The SFB received 105 applications from 44 districts. The application project cost total reached \$103.8 million. The SFB awarded 29 energy efficiency projects to 25 districts which are estimated to save \$5.6 million per year and have an average payback of eight years. Table 4 contains information on the energy efficiency grant awards.

Arizona Energy and Water Savings Grant Program

The School Facilities Board implemented the Arizona Energy and Water Savings Grant Program during FY 2008 and continued to manage and closeout the projects throughout FY 2009. During FY 2010, the projects were monitored and data collected to compare the FY 2008 baseline data with a full year of utility usage after the improvements were completely implemented. Designed as a competitive grant program, the available \$2 million in funding was divided into two categories: development grants and implementation grants. See Exhibit II on page 36 for FY 2010 distributions.

School districts submitted 27 applications for development grants and 164 applications for implementation grants.

Table 5 and Table 6 list the awardees including the funding that has been expended and the current status of each project. In total, projects funded by the grants are expected to save \$500,000 per year with a total payback of four years.

Table 7 lists six projects, as examples, that were completed during FY 2009. The table compares energy usage during FY 2008 (baseline data) with that during FY 2010. The savings are the actual savings over each twelve month period. The actual savings may also include other energy efficiency measures that the district may have implemented in addition to these energy and water saving grant projects.

Building Renewal Grant Program

In FY 2010, the Legislature appropriated \$3 million to the Building Renewal Grant fund for the School Facilities Board to administer and distribute to districts for the purpose of maintaining the adequacy of existing school facilities. As part of the FY 2010 budget fix, \$332,100 was swept, resulting in a balance of \$2,667,900 being allocated for Building Renewal Grant projects. School districts may

request Building Renewal Grant funding for primary building renewal projects which the Board will prioritize based on district routine preventative maintenance and the matching of monies provided by the fund. The SFB approved 31 Building Renewal Grant projects and increased the budget for three previously-approved projects. These approvals are listed in Table 8. See Exhibit III on page 37 for a complete distribution list.

5-Year Assessments

A.R.S. §15-2002.A.3 requires the SFB to inspect school buildings once every five years to ensure the compliance with building adequacy standards as prescribed in A.R.S. §15-2001. These inspections are designed to verify the reported size of each school and to ensure that each school continues to meet all State school facility minimum adequacy guidelines.

In FY 2010, the most commonly found deficiencies were the lack of the required science equipment, low lighting, missing jurisdictional inspection reports and drainage issues. At the end of each inspection, the school district governing board is notified about any identified deficiencies and the SFB works with the district to develop a plan to correct these deficiencies.

Preventative Maintenance Inspections

A.R.S. §15-2002.A.3 requires the SFB to randomly select twenty school districts every thirty months and inspect them with regard to routine preventative maintenance. The Preventative Maintenance Inspections have revealed some inadequacies in the preventative maintenance being performed by school districts mostly resulting from lack of funding and staffing levels. However, it appears districts are performing preventative maintenance to the best of their ability with the resources they have available.

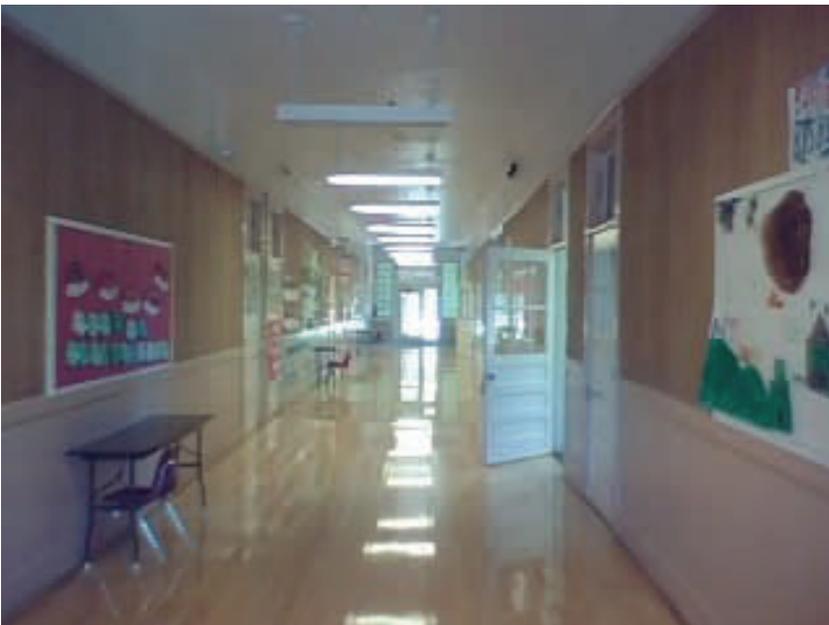

the SFB developed a district self-evaluation questionnaire, the inspection criteria and the form staff will use during the inspection process. The SFB also facilitates a training workshop as part of the inspection process to help individual districts with staff training and a 6-month follow-up to reinforce district staff knowledge.

Statewide Water Intrusion Analysis

During the past year, the SFB continued to receive requests for funding for the repair of interior mold damage. What has been found in many cases is water intrusion through the exterior block walls into the interior of the building.

In most cases, the recommended maintenance or recoating of the block sealant has not been done or has been done incorrectly. The SFB has incorporated testing of the exterior block of each school for water absorption in all 5-Year and Preventative Maintenance Inspections. When the test indicates there may be an issue with the existing block sealant, the district is notified so appropriate action may be taken.

Building Renewal

The School Facilities Board distributes Building Renewal funds to school districts to help them maintain their existing facilities. Distributions are based on a formula that considers the size and age of existing space. However, in FY 2010 due to budget constraints, the Legislature did not fund the building renewal formula. Rather, \$3 million dollars in Building Renewal Grant funding was appropriated to help school districts maintain their existing facilities. Districts were also able to use Building Renewal funds carried forward from prior years, and are required to report that expenditure activity to the SFB. See Exhibit V on page 39.

On the Horizon Initiatives

Arizona School Design Primer

The Arizona Chapter of the American Institute of Architects created a coalition of professional practitioners and civic leaders to coordinate efforts advocating for smarter school building projects. A dialogue between the AIA Coalition and the SFB began with the publication of the SFB report to the Governor in September 2007 titled,

“Building Arizona’s 21st Century Schools: Ensuring Innovative School Facilities for the Digital Age.” One of the outcomes of that dialogue has been the preparation of the “Arizona School Design Primer.”

The Primer is meant to be a quick read, hitting on overarching observations of the qualities that can motivate quality school design. The principal author of the Primer is AIA Member, and President of her own firm, Marlene Imirzian, AIA. Ms. Imirzian envisions the audience of the Primer as school board members, other local school district officials, and parents. Her hope is that the basic ideas presented in the booklet will raise the bar of expectations that Arizona can build smarter schools within the budget constraints we will be facing for the foreseeable future.

The SFB continues to assist with production of the Primer. Here are a few excerpts.

Focus of the Primer:

- To improve the quality of Arizona education with school designs that improve learning outcomes.

Overview continued

- To raise the level of discourse and expectations of school design within the State at the level of the key decision-makers (school district superintendents, school board members and key facilities personnel).
- To empower the key decision-makers for school design and construction in the State of Arizona with fundamental information needed to make good decisions regarding school design based on the most current research and successful project case studies.

The book focuses on the first building decisions that, once made, are often irreversible, in the hope that those first decisions can be made with better knowledge, leading to better buildings for learning.
